Introduction

This report presents the context indicators associated with the TMEP Lower Mainland Region, updated to reflect the April to June (Q2) 2021 monitoring period. These data are from public and government sources. They reflect the overall social and economic context within which Project construction is occurring and present a picture of the overall social and economic vulnerability or resiliency of the region related to the socio-economic monitoring topic areas. Data is being reported for the entire region, even though construction activity may only be occurring in a select portion of the region. These data will be updated during Project construction when new data becomes available. This report also provides a one-time update of select community-level data points for communities crossed by the Project footprint have been updated since the finalization of the Socio-Economic Effects Monitoring Plan based on the 2016 Census of Canada; this data is only updated every 5 years, so will not be updated during the Project construction period.

Methodology and Notes

Notes

- 1 The Lower Mainland / Southwest Economic Region consists of: 4 regional districts; 14 cities, including Chilliwack, Abbotsford, Surrey, Coquitlam and Burnaby; 12 district municipalities, including Hope and Langley; 6 towns and villages; an Island Municipality; 96 Indian Reserves; and an Indian Government District. It is a grouping of complete census divisions created by Statistics Canada as a standard geographic unit for analysis of regional economic activity.
- 2 The Vancouver CMA consists of: 1 regional district (Metro Vancouver); 12 cities, including Surrey, Coquitlam and Burnaby; 5 district municipalities, including Langley; 3 villages; an Island Municipality; and 17 Indian Reserves.
- 3 Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) presents data for Langley which consists of the City of Langley and the Township of Langley.
- 4 CMHC presents data for Tri-Cities which consists of City of Coquitlam, City of Port Coquitlam and City of Port Moody.

All numbers are approximate. In certain instances (e.g., gender-based crimes), additional decimal spaces are shown in order to capture small numbers.
