Introduction

This report presents the context indicators associated with the TMEP North Thompson Region, updated to reflect the January to March (Q1) 2022 monitoring period. These data are from public and government sources. They reflect the overall socio-economic context within which Project construction is occurring and present a picture of the overall social and economic vulnerability or resiliency of the region related to the socio-economic monitoring topic areas. Data is being reported for the entire region, even though construction activity may only be occurring in a select portion of the region. These data will be updated during Project construction when new data becomes available. This report also provides a one-time update of select community-level data points for communities crossed by the Project footprint have been updated since the finalization of the Socio-Economic Effects Monitoring Plan based on the 2016 Census of Canada; this data is only updated every 5 years, so will not be updated during the Project construction period.

Context Indicators

In this region, the Project is occurring in a predominantly rural area. The population of the communities traversed by the Project in this region is approximately 8,000 with a labour force of approximately 4,000, with a wider regional population of over 500,000 and regional labour force of over 290,000. TMEP is the one known major capital project under construction in this region. The current and anticipated Project workforce is small in the context of this region.

Qualitative Information Summary from Northern Health			
Valemount clinic facing staffing shortage; 2 funded registered nurse positions are not filled. There is risk of facing intermittent clinic closures. Lack of available housing is hindering recruitment efforts. Current clinic staff workload is facing additional pressures as result of the pipeline workforce. Staff at clinic note 4 to 5 TMEP workforce per day visit the clinic. Sexually transmitted infection rates are presenting that are not characteristic of Valemount. After hours calls have increased.
