Introduction

This report presents the context indicators associated with the TMEP North Thompson Region, updated to reflect the January to March (Q1) 2022 monitoring period. These data are from public and government sources. They reflect the overall socio-economic context within which Project construction is occurring and present a picture of the overall social and economic vulnerability or resiliency of the region related to the socio-economic monitoring topic areas. Data is being reported for the entire region, even though construction activity may only be occurring in a select portion of the region. These data will be updated during Project construction when new data becomes available. This report also provides a one-time update of select community-level data points for communities crossed by the Project footprint have been updated every 5 years, so will not be updated during the Project construction period.

Qualitative Information Summary from Northern Health

Valemount clinic facing staffing shortage; 2 funded registered nurse positions are not filled. There is risk of facing intermittant clinic closures. Lack of available housing is hinding recruitment efforts. Current clinic staff workload is facing additional pressures as result of the pipeline workforce. Staff at clinic note 4 to 5 TMEP workforce per day visit the clinic. Sexually transmitted infection rates are presenting that are not characteristic of Valemount. After hours calls have increased.
